OVERSEAS COLLEGE COUNSELLING



The SAT and ACT are required by colleges in the USA as well as at universities in other countries. The decision by a student as to which test to "sit" is a matter of choice. Both are designed to measure academic achievement: the ACT in English, Mathematics, Reading and Science; the SAT in Reading and Writing, Math, and The Essay. The fees for both are similar, ranging from approximately 80 – 110 USD. The main difference is that the ACT has a science test, whilst the SAT does not. However, the SAT has subject tests for which students can register, including the specific branches of science. The ACT Writing Test and the SAT Essay are both optional components.

PRIMARY SCHOOL STUDENT SUPPORT ELL STRATEGIES FOR HOME



With multilingual children, there are so many strategies we could use to develop English as a Second Language. One way would be the use of a solid mother tongue in order to build on a second language. Here are some FAQ regarding this matter.

- How does the mother tongue help the learning of English? Research has shown skills acquired in a first language could be transferred into a second language at ease. For example, a child that reads well and uses appropriate strategies in their first language could also be a good reader in their English as a Second Language. Therefore, learning skills in the first language should be encouraged at home in order to develop their second language.
- Why should mother tongue be maintained and developed? The children in international schools will return to their home country at some point to continue their education there and therefore they need to maintain their skills. Also holding on to their cultural identity through language.
- How can ESL students best develop their mother tongue? Parents can make sure that they have good reference books or textbooks at home in the native language. Students should be encouraged to read good literature and to discuss school work.




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
Assessment in Practice: We have recently concluded the second exam week. What might have your child taken from this experience, and how did teachers create the examinations?

To ensure best practices, many of our meetings for the teaching staff at MEF IS are designed to refresh and extend teachers' understandings. This week was no exception as we focused on assessment practice. The discussions were inspired by *Classroom Assessment for Student Learning* by Jan Chappuis, Rick Stiggins, Steve Chappuis and Judith Arter.

The book's authors claim that one important aspect of the teaching and learning process is assessment. When assessments do not measure learning and attainment, they are irritating, and sometimes painful, exercises that dissuade learning. Assessment is, indeed, a complex affair that is multi-faceted. Throughout a unit, students should be reminded of end-of-unit learning targets and constantly receive feedback on progress towards meeting these targets through a multitude of measures, including homework, daily assignments, quizzes, and projects, to name a few. Additional, the unit's purpose and learning targets should be made clear from the beginning. Furthermore, the various assessment devices (e.g. selected response, written response and performance assessment), along with an understanding of their usage, must be comprehended. Lastly, it is highly advisable to make assessments into learning tools. When teachers follow best practice, children learn more, stress less, and, in many cases, look forward to assessments.


